Peckham has some fantastic townscape!



Jones and Higgins is a fine landmark identifying Peckham's former village centre. Its Portland stone and granite detailing show the quality and generosity of Britain's best historic townscape.



Will Alsop's Stirling prize winning Peckham Library looks great hovering over the Georgian Shard's Terrace. A Peckham Conservation Area could nurture great contemporary architecture which can offer a spicy foil to our best historic buildings.



Some of Peckham's historic town-scape has survived from the Eighteenth and Nineteenth centuries. Peckham now faces considerable development pressure. Without a conservation area all of the streetscape shown above could be lost within a few years.



Each of the different styles of Victorian design can be found on Peckham's High Street, a conservation area can help us pass on this story to future generations



One or two buildings in the centre of Peckham are listed, like the handsome Greek Revival Baptist Chapel. A conservation area can help ensure that these buildings remain in a sympathetic setting.



The townscape of the south end of Rye Lane has remained largely intact since 1905. With the protection of a conservation area, and improvements to shop fronts, the look of Peckham's genteel and elegant past could be easily revived.
